Teutonic Allies and the Russians Are Preparing to Engage in a Great Battle

RUSSIAN POLAND SCENE OF ACTION

London, Oct. 13, 10.05 A. M.—All eyes to-day are turned to the East-ward, where, under conditions of the utmost secrecy, the Teutonic allies and utmost secrecy, the feature arises and the Russians are preparing to engage in what may prove one of the most de-cisive combats of the war. Evidence is accumulating to show that the gigantic conflict will be determined in Russian Poland and the only question disturbing British experts is as to which side has chosen the battle ground.






The Battle Along the Aisne

And, of course, the transports must follow hard after the troops, for they must be supplied with animunition and will want food as soon as there is an opportunity to eat it. Before the order is given for the troops to advance, in fact often for hours—in one case it was thirty-six hours—before the battle begins, we have to stand by to set the motor going, and off we start, never knowing, but always praying, that we may get through successfully." 
