

AUSTRIAN, WOUNDED BY LANCE THRUST, SHOTS COSSACK DEAD ON HORSE

New York, Nov. 25.—Fritz Kreisler, an Austrian violinist of note, who served as a lieutenant in the Third Kratz regiment, and was wounded in battle near Lemberg, reached New York yesterday on the steamer Rotterdam. He was accompanied by his wife who served as a Red Cross nurse in the Austrian army.

"I was wounded on the night of September 16," said Mr. Kreisler. "While resisting a charge of Russian Cossacks I was knocked down by a horse. As the rider passed over me he sank his lance into my right thigh. It caught in my coat and before he could withdraw it, I shot and killed him. I laid in the trench for hours until I was found. I was then taken to a hospital near Vienna and nursed back to health by my wife."

CHECKING GERMAN ATTEMPT TO TURN THE RUSSIAN FLANK

London, Nov. 25, 4.47 A. M.—The German attempt to turn the Russian flank at Wielun Pass was expected and checked, says the "Times" Petrograd correspondent. "The difficulties of the Russian operations in Poland were enormously aggravated by the havoc the Germans wrought during their retreat from Warsaw."

WEEK OF HARD FIGHTING ENDS IN RUSSIAN SUCCESS

London, Nov. 25, 3.15 A. M.—The Petrograd correspondent of the "Morning Post" says that the Russian success in Poland, as announced in official dispatches, was preceded by a week of hard fighting with varied success and reverses. In the neighborhood of Brzezina the Germans made a supreme effort and actually succeeded in temporarily breaking through the Russian defense and getting to the rear of the Russian positions, says the correspondent. It appears, however, that the Germans did not fully realize their chances and the Russians countered by piercing the German lines at another point, compelling the Germans to withdraw with the loss of a whole battery of heavy artillery and two regiments of prisoners.

PLOT TO KILL A CANADIAN GENERAL IS FRUSTRATED

London, Ontario, Nov. 25.—The local police asserted yesterday that by the arrest of three Turks last Thursday night they had frustrated an attempt to assassinate Major General Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defense. The authorities claimed that letters found in the possession of the prisoners indicated an attempt was to have been made on the life of General Hughes upon his arrival here today. One of the letters, the police assert, bears a Detroit postmark on the envelope and urges the Turks to "do their duty" and not to be afraid of "meeting the man they had been instructed to kill." The same letter contained information about a man referred to as "one of Canada's biggest military men" who was coming here. Details of the plot charged by the police were first obtained, they asserted, in Detroit.

OBTAINS BIG FRENCH ORDER: 20,000 STEEL PROJECTILES

Pittsburgh, Nov. 25.—Having just completed an order for 10,000 5-inch high-speed projectile steel bullets for the French government, the Crucible Steel Company yesterday began the manufacture of 20,000 5-inch high-speed projectiles for the same government. The order was received from a New York exporting house, which is purchasing war munitions in this country for European belligerents. While officials of the Crucible Steel Company are averse to talking of these orders, it is understood that the new 5-inch shells are to be fabricated in the local plants. This means that not only will the steel be rolled, but the shells will be completed ready for charging, which, it is understood, will be done at the plant of an eastern ammunition company.

Portugal to Join Allies Lisbon, Nov. 25.—The Portuguese Congress yesterday decided that Portugal should co-operate with the allies when it considers the step necessary. The Minister of War will issue a decree for partial mobilization.

Redmond's Brother in Army London, Nov. 25.—William Redmond, brother of the Irish leader, has joined the army, with the rank of captain. He was formerly a lieutenant in the Wexford militia.

FRANK STILL FIGHTS FOR LIFE

Counsel to Ask Full Bench of Supreme Court for Writ of Error Washington, Nov. 25.—It was said last night that counsel for Leo M. Frank would ask the full bench of the Supreme Court on Monday for leave to file a petition for a writ of error. Henry Peoples, of Frank's counsel, left for Georgia yesterday to prepare for an appeal to the Board of Pardons.

EXPECT DISPERSAL OF GREAT BRITISH ART COLLECTIONS

London, Nov. 25.—According to well-known art dealers, at the conclusion of the war many families here will be forced to get rid of art objects of great value. The heirs of many prominent families have been killed in battle, and it is believed this will mean the dispersal of famous collections. Speaking about this, one dealer said yesterday that for a long time after war art dealers will have to look to America and her millionaires to dispose of works of art. It is said at Christie's that no auction sales have been planned for months to come. Dealers say they have no commissions from Americans for the purchase of art objects at present.

Help for Starving Belgians Marietta, Nov. 25.—The people of this community have come to the front in the call for help by the starving Belgians with cash and provisions, and today a large check was sent to Philadelphia by Albert C. 



GET TO FIRE IN RECORD TIME

Ranger Quickly Gets Hired Men to Scene of Forest Blaze Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—What is supposed to be record speed in getting men to a forest fire is reported from Oregon, where one of the national forests, a ranger went to town, hired ten men and got this force to the fire twelve miles away within forty-eight minutes after he was notified by telephone.

Forbach, Germany, is said to have the most profitable town forest known; it yields an annual net gain of \$12.14 an acre. The State school forestry at Bottineau, North Dakota, announces that it will have a million trees for distribution to the citizens of the State during 1915.

Apple wood, used almost exclusively for saw handles, also furnishes the material for many so-called brier-wood pipes and particularly for the large wooden type used in printing signs and posters.

One of the most expensive woods used regularly in an established industry in the United States is boxwood, the favorite material for wood engraving. It has been quoted at four cents a cubic inch, and about \$1,300 by the thousand board feet.

STATE'S ONLY CAMP GROUND

Mount Gretna Becomes National Guard's Rendezvous Mount Gretna, Pa., Nov. 25.—Title was passed yesterday by Mrs. Anna C. Rogers, of New York, to the State of Pennsylvania for the 1,200-acre tract of land on which for many years the annual encampments of the Pennsylvania National Guard have been held. With the acquisition of the Rogers tract the State's holdings here are increased to 1,500 acres, including practically all the ground necessary for the location of permanent State camp grounds. The statement is made that Mount Gretna will now be officially designated as the State's permanent camp ground, and will be so used annually in the future.

FERRY CREW FIGHT A WHALE

Ten-Foot Dweller of Sea Tries to Board Boat in Delaware Bristol, Nov. 25.—A whale more than ten feet in length created excitement in the Delaware river yesterday morning when it appeared in mid-stream and fought to land on the ferry boat William B. Doran. The crew of the ferry boat belabored the whale with shovels and forks, and after considerable battering the whale gave up the fight and swam down stream. A large crowd of spectators witnessed the fight from the Pennsylvania shore.

HOPE LOST FOR HUNTERS

Three Missing Minnesotans Given Up As Dead Ely, Minn., Nov. 25.—The searching party which went to the north arm of Burnside Lake yesterday to search for three hunters who last were seen in a canoe on the lake on Monday of last week returned yesterday and reported that all three men probably were dead. They found no trace of the hunters John Kilbann, Eric Peterson and Joseph Anderson.

Train Kills Track Walker

Marysville, Pa., Nov. 25.—Samuel Groff, a track walker of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company at Thompson-ton, was instantly killed yesterday morning when he was struck by a passenger train. He was 60 years old.

Killed at Columbus, Ohio

Marysville, Pa., Nov. 25.—John Hough, 35 years old, of this place, was instantly killed in a gas explosion at Columbus, O., Monday.

DROP MURDER CHARGES

Michigan Authorities Despair of Convictions in Strike Cases Houghton, Mich., Nov. 25.—Houghton county officials yesterday decided to drop prosecution of three men charged with murder in connection with the disorder which grew out of the copper miners' strike last year. Assistant Attorney General Nichols told the Houghton county supervisors that the chance of convicting the accused was too small to warrant proceeding. The men are Nick Verbanac, Jalmer Jalonen and Joseph Juntunen, charged with the murder of Thomas Dally and Henry and Arthur Jane in Painesdale last December.

KANSAS WHEAT OUTLOOK

State Reports Great Fall Acreage, With Condition of 83.23 Topeka, Kan., Nov. 25.—The condition of fall wheat in Kansas is 83.23 and the area seeded approximates 8,374,000 acres, according to a report of the State Board of Agriculture yesterday. The acreage this year is second in the history of the State, being surpassed only by that of last year, the report states.

Lebanon Gets Road Pointers

Lebanon, Pa., Nov. 25.—Lebanon county road supervisors and road masters, at their second annual convention here yesterday, were addressed by C. V. Henry, President Judge of the Lebanon county courts; State Senator D. P. Gerberich, of this city; former Assemblyman William C. Freeman, Cornwall; Dr. Donald McCaskey, Lancaster, and George Biles, engineer of the State Highway Department.

Third One Loses License

Lebanon, Pa., Nov. 25.—President Judge Henry, of the Lebanon county courts, yesterday revoked the liquor license granted William S. Dohr for the Swatara hotel, in Swatara township, and Dohr must appear in court today for sentence, having entered pleas of guilty on three charges of selling liquor on Sunday. This is the third revocation directed this year by Judge Henry.

Flag Recalls Lookout Mountain

Selinsgrove, Pa., Nov. 25.—Pioneers' Day at Susquehanna University was observed yesterday by the decoration of a 60-foot flagpole. Dr. F. P. Manhart, dean of the school of theology, was orator of the day, and the flag was hoisted by Dr. David B. Floyd and Joseph Lumbard, local veterans, who fought in the battle of Lookout mountain, of which conflict yesterday was the fifty-first anniversary.

SEIGEL FACES SECOND SUIT


Charge of Missing Mails May Be Made by Federal Government New York, Nov. 25.—Assistant United States District Attorney Roger B. Wood, in charge of the criminal bureau, stated yesterday that the government is looking into the case of Henry Siegel with a possible view of instituting a prosecution for misuse of the mails. According to the federal criminal code, the mailing of a false statement with intent to defraud is a felony. District Attorney Whitman, it was said, will be asked to furnish the government with a copy of the minutes of the recent Siegel trial, and Mr. Wood will confer with Assistant District Attorney Arthur C. Train, about the bankrupt merchant's case.

BYRAN TO STAY IN CABINET

Secretary of State Emphatically Denies That He Will Resign Washington, Nov. 25.—Secretary of State Bryan denied in the most positive terms yesterday the published report that he is to retire from the Cabinet in March of next year. He said however, that he had leased his home in Miami, Fla., to Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Davis, of Boalsburg, Centre county, Pa. This action, he said, had been taken because he found that his duties in the State Department would prevent him from spending the winters in Florida.

FIGHTING CONTINUES ALONG WHOLE OF RUSSIA'S FAR FLUNG BATTLE LINE.

German official reports record fighting along the whole Russian line, from the Baltic to Galicia. In East Prussia they declare the situation is unchanged, but other despatches say the Russians have captured Gumbinnen. In Poland, according to the German report, the appearance of Russian reinforcements is postponing a decision of the battle. The struggle for Cracow continues northeast of that town and east of Czestochowa.
