One of the standbys in the game there in recent years had the following to say of the prospects in Chickentówn: "The chance was never batter. I know positively that if a consicentious, honest and hard working man, who knows baseball players, takes hold of the situation here he can in a very short period raiss \$1,500 in eash. He can get five men as helpmates—not 'directors,' as they have been called— who will assist him to the last ditch. "I am sure that at least two big league clubs are anxious to put their surplus players here if Wilmington will pay half the salary. Even if each man got \$200 a month, that would, with 14 players, require but \$1,400 a month from Wilmington. And my experience has taught me that Wilmington can make money with a first division team with only a \$1,500 salary drain. "We can get into the league. That I know. The grounds are easily ob-tainable, of that I am sure.
