VISITORS AT VALLEY FORGE

Increase Last Year Partly Attributed to

Autos and Motorcycles
Philadelphia, Jan. 8.—More than half a million persons visited Washing-Encampment at Valley Forge during the 11 months ending with November last year, according to the biennial report of the Valley Forge Park more than for the corresponding period

of 1913.

In the statistics given in the report note is made that the greatest increase in the number of visitors is shown in the class that visited the historic ground in vehicles. There was an increase of 21,311 persons who came in motor cars and an increase of 1,503 who came on materials.

Reference is made in the report to the dedication of the New Jersey and Delaware monuments; to the erection of a bronze memorial erected by Pennsylvania to Major General Armstrong, of the Pennsylvania militia, as well as to the near completion of the memorial arch erected by the United States. With reference to this arch, the report comments that owing to the lack of appropriation by Congress it has not yet been transferred to the Commonwealth, and adds: "It is hoped that a sufficient appropriation will be made by the Commonwealth to provide for a transfer with appropriate ceremonies."

The report likewise comments that since the year 1907 no appropriations for the purchase of additional parts of the original encampment site have been made.
