BOLDS KLEIN & COMPANY IS LIABLE FOR ALL DEBTS

Bankruptcy Trustee Brings Suit Against Directors of the Concern to Compel Them to Pay Majority of the Claims

Alleging that the directors of Klein & Co., formerly a Market square firm dealing in ladies' furnishings, before going into the hands of a receiver, contracted debts far in excess of the company's authorized capital stock, \$10,000, Job J. Cooklin, bankruptcy trustee of the concern, has brought an equity suit against them to recover such amounts for which they may be held liable.

W. K. Meyers, counsel for the trustee, in the statement filed, makes a demand on the directors to produce evidence showing what portion of the capital stock was paid in, who paid it and to whom it was paid. The company's indebtedness is fixed at \$26,771.85. Of the authorized capital stock, it is contended, only \$1,000 was paid in and that the directors are liable for the debts in excess of that sum.

The directors are given thirty days in which to make answer.

BRUMBAUGH HAS CABINET GUESSERS STILL AT SEA

Governor-elect Preserving Profoundest Reticence Concerning Any of the Appointments He Will Make When He Assumes Ship of State

Up to the present very little can be learned, even in the way of gossip, concerning the cabinet that Governor Brumbaugh proposes to appoint when he takes office next week, and the quid nuncs, those who have heretofore professed to have had a line on prospective cabinets, are all at sea, and have given up guessing. Dr. Brumbaugh is preserving the profoundest reticence concerning any of his appointments, and all conjectures are mere guesses, and nothing else, for he has repeatedly declared that he will make no mention of them until he deems proper and even then he will not say when that time shall be.

The latest talk concerning the new Governor's immediate family is that his choice for private secretary lies between James Hiatt and Harry P. McDevitt, both of Philadelphia, and both close personal friends. Mr. Hiatt had charge of Dr. Brumbaugh's preliminary campaign for Governor and directed affairs from headquarters in Philadelphia during the campaign that ended in his election. He is secretary of the Philadelphia Board of Education at a salary of \$5,000 per year, and as such has been very close to Dr. Brumbaugh, who was at the head of the Philadelphia public schools.

Mr. Devitt was formerly a Philadelphia newspaper man, a political writer on the "Press," and for the last four years has had several positions requiring keen executive ability under the Toner administration, the last being chairman of the Commission on Economy and Efficiency. He personally had charge of the Brumbaugh party on its tour of Pennsylvania, for the reason that his knowledge of politics and large political acquaintance in the State were invaluable adjuncts in a campaign of that magnitude. It is agreed that either one of these gentlemen would make an ideal private secretary who would have to stand between the Governor's private room and the many who would be anxious to have personal interviews with the chief executive. A story is current that the announcement of the entire cabinet will be made when Dr. Brumbaugh arrives in Harrisburg next Monday.

Board to Meet The Board of Revenue Commissioners will hold a meeting to-morrow to finish up its business under the present administration.

Action on Appointments The Senate Committee on Executive Nominations, a new committee in charge of the nominations made by Governor Toner, will be announced on next Monday evening, and will at once proceed to consider the recess nominations. Among these are the Public Service Commission, and a number of other State officials and members of public institution boards.

New Justice Governor Toner to-day appointed Walter S. Kenney to be justice of the peace for Muhlenberg township, Berks county, to succeed W. G. Sarig, elected member of the House.
