HARVARD FLAG MAY FLY AGAIN Bill Filed to Prevent Classing Crimson

Bill Filed to Prevent Classing Crimson With Red's Banner

Boston, Jan. 18.—Harvard's crimson banner, which has been under cover since early fall, when discovery was made that carrying it in public was a violation of the "anti-red flag" law, may soon be put in good standing. A bill has been filed with the Legislature to legalize the Harvard colors.

The proposed statute amends the present law so that any religious, educational or charitable organization may file a distinguishing mark or marks and that the carrying of a red, black or red and black flag in any authorized parade shall not be evidence of opposition to organized government. The measure probably will permit the anti-suffragists to flaunt their red and black banner. Socialists assert that the measure is an attempt at class legislation.


