STEEL LIGHTLY TRADED IN AND STOCK TAKES BIG DROP

Sales of Only 1,000 Shares Were Made in the First Hour, All at the Minimum—Preferred Added to Initial Decline

New York, Jan. 27.—(Wall Street)—Passing of the dividend on United States Steel common yesterday had an unsettling effect upon the market at today's opening. Steel was only lightly traded in, but fell from yesterday's closing price of 51 1/2 to its minimum of 48 without any intermediate sales. The preferred stock, whose dividend remains unchanged, promptly fell 1/4 points. Throughout the active list there were losses of 1 and 2 points, and the transcontinentals being weakest. The decline extended to steel sinking fund bonds, which fell half a point. London's range for Americans was higher than the local market, Steel being the only issue to show marked heaviness there.

Trading in the first hour aggregated 140,000 shares, equaling the activity on the recent upturn. Sales of Steel in that period were exactly 1,000 shares, all at the minimum. In the unofficial market, established while the stock exchange was closed, sales of Steel were reported at 46. Steel pfd. added to its initial decline, selling at a little over a point from its minimum. Reading, the Hill and Harriman shares, Pennsylvania, Canadian Pacific, St. Paul and New York Central sold lower, also Amalgamated Copper, Smelting and some less prominent issues. Slight recovery was made in the second hour on a declining volume of business. Bonds were from one-half to a point lower.

CAPTAIN ERDMANN AMONG THE BLUECHER'S WOUNDED

London, Jan. 27, 5.16 A. M.—Captain Erdmann, of the German armored cruiser Bluecher, which was sunk in the recent battle in the North sea, has been placed among the wounded, according to the Edinburgh correspondent of the "Times." He is suffering from shock. The Lion and the Tiger were the only British battle cruisers that sustained material damage in the fight, the correspondent adds. The Lion had her speed reduced, but that soon can be remedied. The Princess Royal, another of the British battle cruisers, which had almost as big a part in the action, the correspondent states, is practically unscathed.

London, Jan. 27, 4.53 A. M.—Most of the warships engaged in Sunday's naval battle in the North sea returned home Monday and during Monday night, it was announced here to-day. The Lion, the flagship of Sir David Beatty, was the last of the battle cruisers to arrive. She returned Tuesday morning, when the Arcturion and the Laurel, among the light cruisers; some of the best-voiced and the battle cruisers Tiger, Princess Royal, Indomitable and New Zealand were already at their moorings.
