To Extend Easy Child Birth Method THE GERMAN ATTEMPT ON WARSAW, THE CAPITAL OF RUSSIAN POLAND



The above picture shows a column of German infantry, accompanied by artillery, advancing to the attack on Warsaw, which town is the objective of German endeavor in Poland. The picture gives a good idea of the nature of the country in which the Germans and Russians have been at grips.

The long plains, with hardly a rise perceptible for miles around, are quite typical of the country leading to Warsaw. Across such country as this it is often necessary for an army to retreat or advance twenty or thirty miles in order to obtain some particular strategic position. It will be noticed that the Germans are advancing across country through which an electric railway runs. To the right of the picture can be seen the two sets of railway lines with their over-
