U. S. STEEL FEATURES THE STOCK MARKET OPENING

terday Has Influence in Contributing to Further Rise of Securities in

New York, Feb. 11.—Wall Street— United States Steel was the feature of interest at the opening of to-day's strong stock market, its very favorable tonnage statment of the previous day contributing to a further rise. Initial trading in steel amounted to 1,500 shares at 42% and 42%, from which it soon advanced to 43%. Union Pacific, Reading and Atchison also rose a point or more, with substantial advances in other speculative favorites. The movement embraced a number of specialties, but these were less prominent than usual. The rise was attended by considerable short covering. London's range for Americans indicated more steadiness.

Captain "Jim" is two years his junior and retires with the rank of a third lieutenant because of splendid service during the civil war.
