U. S. STEEL FEATURES THE STOCK MARKET OPENING

Favorable Tonnage Statement of Yesterday Has Influence in Contributing to Further Rise of Securities in Today's Transactions

New York, Feb. 11.—Wall Street—United States Steel was the feature of interest at the opening of to-day's strong stock market, its very favorable tonnage statement of the previous day contributing to a further rise. Initial trading in steel amounted to 1,500 shares at 42 1/2 and 42 3/4, from which it soon advanced to 43 1/2. Union Pacific, Reading and Atchafalaya also rose a point or more; with substantial advances in other speculative favorites. The movement embraced a number of specialties, but these were less prominent than usual. The rise was attended by considerable short covering. London's range for Americans indicated more steadiness.

Trading in steel during the first hour was larger than the combined operations in all the other leaders. By noon the stock had sold up to 43 1/2, a gain of 1 1/2 points over yesterday. Copper shares also showed a good undertone on the increase of wages to miners in the Michigan district and restoration of the Calumet and Hecla dividend. Southern Pacific justified its strength in the declaration of the regular quarterly dividend. Western roads were not affected by the decision of the Commerce Commission respecting rates from Missouri River territory to the Pacific coast. Bonds were steady.

MILITARY ACTIVITY IN THE UPPER ALSACE IS FIERCE
Berne, via Paris, Feb. 11, 1.05 A. M.—Great military activity is apparent in Upper Alsace, especially in the Larg valley and in the districts of Pforzhausen and Rechesy, close to the Swiss frontier, where fierce artillery duels take place every day.

Two hundred German volunteers, covering their uniforms with sheets so they would not make such excellent targets when outlined against the snow, crept up to the barbed wire entanglements in front of the French trenches Wednesday night. They were not discovered until they were about to cut the wire. Then French machine guns opened fire and the Germans were forced to retire, leaving half their number in killed and wounded.

Summon Belligerents in Conference
Paris, Feb. 11, 6.20 A. M.—The International Socialist Bureau has summoned delegates both from belligerent and neutral nations to meet at the Hague. They will confer separately and later hold a general assembly if one can be arranged.

A Warning to Populace to Leave
London, Feb. 11, 11.15 A. M.—The "News" Cologne correspondent telegraphs he has learned that the population of Insterburg, East Prussia, has been advised by the military authorities to leave the town.

Experimenting With Types of Bread
Rome, Feb. 11, 5.50 A. M.—Two different types of bread are being experimented with here. One contains 12 per cent. of rice and the other same proportion of bran. King Victor Emmanuel and Premier Salandra tested both kinds of bread and found it excellent, it is said.

CAPTAINS WHO ENDED LONG TERMS IN THE REVENUE CUTTER SERVICE

Here is shown Captain James Bradley and Captain John Bradley, first cousins, as they stood on the deck of the United States Coast Guard cutter Hudson the other day and had their photographs taken. The occasion was the retirement from active service of these two skippers, who leave behind them records for active and conscientious service seldom excelled. Captain John Bradley is seventy-four years old and in his time has piloted many Presidents of the United States. Captain "Jim" is two years his junior and retired with the rank of a third lieutenant because of splendid service during the civil war. The former has been a pilot of a revenue cutter for forty-two years and Captain "Jim" has worn the insignia of the Revenue Service for twenty-seven years.
