JOHNSON FAVORS PLAN

He Would Eliminate Draft From American Association

Philadelphia, Feb. 15.—Before leaving for California on a three-week vacation trip, President B. B. Johnson, of the American League, made the first significant expression of his views regarding the elimination of the draft from the American Association clubs. The league head, also a member of the National Commission, declared his sympathy with the request of the major minors and his approval thereof, but admitted definite action must await the sanction of the National League.

"I think the request ought to be granted," said Johnson. "As a matter of fact, it should have been done a year ago. The association ought to be helped in its battle against the Federals. I hardly think such action would operate against the Payers. At any rate we ought to give it a trial. It does not seem to me it would affect the Pacific Coast League in any way. Those clubs are away off out of the war zone."


