Philadelphia Girl to Act as Sponsor for the Pennsylvania. Philadelphia, Feb. 15.—Miss Elizabeth Laidoff Kolb, daughter of Louis J. Kolb, of West School Lane, Germantown, has been selected by Secretary Daniels to christen the superdreadnought Pennsylvania, which will be launched at Newport News, Va., on Tuesday, March 16.

The Pennsylvania will be one of the most powerful warships in the world. Her length over all is 650 feet, her beam 97 feet and her mean draught nearly 29 feet. She will be protected by sixteen-inch armor amidships.
