GREEKS WIN THE ACADEMY MEET IN UPHILL FIGHT

Take Final Event and Close With Two-Point Margin—Kral and Bennett Tie For Individual Honors—Will Get Gold Medals

So close was the annual indoor meet of the Harrisburg Academy in Chestnut street auditorium last evening that it required the final event for a decision the Greeks winning that event copped the meet with a two-point margin, the final score being, Greeks 63; Romans 61.

It was an uphill fight, the Romans leading most of the time by a few points. More than five hundred were present and it was the most successful meet in the history of these indoor games.

Two gold medals will be awarded to Kral and Bennett, both of whom tied up for individual honors at 9 points. These men were stars of the meet although their team, the Romans, was defeated, George A. Shreiner clearing the bar in the high jump at four feet, seven and one-half inches, set up a new record for the lower form, Jesse Krall broke the high jump record for the upper form and Ruby Bennett bettered the former pole vault record by making eight feet, six inches.
