PRESENT BATTLE LINE IN EASTERN THEATRE OF WAR



100 According to official despatches the German advance toward the Niemen was checked by the Russians, who received reinforcements since their retirement from East Prussia and are holding the line of the Bobr and Narew rivers. Furning southward in the vicinity of Plonsk, the battle line runs almost due south across Russian Poland and part of Galicia to the Carpathians. Following these mountains to the eastward, the Russians hold most of the passes as far at the River Pruth, where their lines turn to the northeast to a point north of Czernowitz and south of the Duiester River.
