faithfully. After the war he returned to Yale, where he resumed his job where he had left off to go to joint army, and was graduated.
For years he was connected with father in the management and editing of the "Village Record," and in 1903, he was made chief clerk of the State Fish Commission, which position he occupied until a short time when frequent attacks of rheumatism and neuritis forced him to take a vacation that did not require him to be active, which he held at the time of death.
In 1877, after the railroad riot was made a member of Governor Evans' military staff, with the rank of Major, having been active as a member of a company in the 1st regiment, National Guard, for several years.
About 25 years ago Major Evans transferred his family residence to Harrisburg, where his wife died a few years ago. His daughter, Miss Elizabeth Evans, survives him. Major Evans was a member of the Pennsylvania Co. Society, the Sons of the American Revolution, the Loyal Legion, the U. S. Army of the Republic and the U. S. League of Philadelphia.
