### FINANCE

**LEADING SHARES GAIN WHEN THE MARKET OPENS TO-DAY**

Germany's Reported Acceptance of U. S. Proposals Favorably Received in the Financial District—Trading Far More Active Than Usual

New York, March 3.—Wall Street—Over night advices from abroad, particularly Germany's reported acceptance of this government's main proposals were favorably received in the financial district to-day, judging from early course of the market. Leading shares made further fractional gains and some of the specialties increased their recent advantage. Trading was far more active than usual, with indications of a moderate investment demand. Among the few features of weakness were Harvester Corporation pfd., which sold at 86, compared with 114 at its previous sale some weeks ago. Distillers bonds also were heavy.

Prices continued to rise during the morning, but business became lighter after the early demand had run its course. Gains in active stocks like the congers, Canadian Pacific, Northern Pacific, United States Steel and American Smelting were extended to a point or beyond. Sales of cotton roads were prominent, Southern Railway pfd., and Atlantic Coast Line recovering part of their recent declines. Motor shares, American Can and more obscure specialties participated in the advance to an appreciable extent. General Electric was among the few high class industrials to show weakness. Foreign bond selling was increasingly extensive on concessions.

### LATE WAR NEWS SUMMARY

Continued From First Page.

French War Office announces that a long stretch of German first line positions is now under control of the allies, but the Berlin military chiefs repeat their assertion that the French have been repulsed and compelled to retire to their own positions. At one point in the Vosges, Berlin announces, the Germans have made an advance of nine miles in the last few days.

The Montenegrin minister at London was advised that an Austrian squadron had bombarded the Montenegrin port of Antivari, inflicting considerable damage.

An Austro-German submarine, composed of six submarines and a number of torpedo boats, has left the Austrian naval base of Pola, on the Adriatic, presumably to strike at the Anglo-French fleet at the Dardanelles. Athens dispatches state that nine battalions of the allied fleet have advanced to the narrowest part of the Dardanelles, bombarding Turkish fortifications and troops and landing a force which scattered a Turkish garrison. It is probable, however, that these dispatches refer to operations on Monday, before the attempt to strike at the Anglo-French fleet by a storm, as was announced by the British Admiralty.

Italy continues military preparations, having taken up in Parliament legislation for increasing the strength of the army. The Minister of War announced that all the classes were asking to enter the army.

A German correspondent on the Galicia front telegraphs to Berlin that the Russians have not won a single complete success in their efforts to regain their lost positions on the crest of the Carpathians. Heavy fighting continues in the snow, the Russians making desperate efforts to ward off the danger of an encircling movement.

German opinion, as reflected in the Berlin press, is divided in regard to the American note to Germany and Great Britain. Some newspapers share the view of the government that the note is an indication of the disinterested friendliness of the country. Other commentators, however, suggest that the note was inspired by regard for American business interests.

### LEGION PLAN A GOOD THING

General Wood Approves Movement to Organize a First Line Reserve for National Defense

New York, March 3.—The interest of Major General Leonard Wood in the newly organized American Legion, which contemplates a first line reserve for national defense, to consist of 250,000 former soldiers, sailors and national guardsmen, to take their places in the fighting line in the event of a national crisis, it was pointed out by friends to-day, consisted in the fact that the plan had been submitted to him and that after he had looked it over he gave it his approval as a "good thing." He approved it just as he would a rifle range or a drill ground about which a citizen might consult him prior to offering it to the government.

General Wood has been called upon by the War Department to make an investigation and report back to the department all the facts he obtains regarding the legion. Such a report, it is expected, will go forward in a few days. Captain Gordon Johnston, aid to General Wood, who issued the statement in which the organization of the American Legion was publicly announced, in a statement to-day said his connection with the legion is of a purely advisory nature.

The American League to Limit Armaments is opposed to the legion and has sent a telegraphic protest signed by Bishop David H. Greer and others of its members to President Wilson.

"We protest against the activities of officers of the army," the protest says, "in organizing civilians and attempting to influence public opinion in regard to the military forces of the country."

### DROPPED DEAD ON STREET

Mrs. John Mumma Succumbs From Heart Trouble on Way Home

While on her way home from the business section of the city, Mrs. John Mumma, aged 53 years, was seized with an attack of heart trouble while walking up the approach of the Malberry street bridge at Fourth and Chestnut streets, last night and died before medical aid could reach her.

When she fell Dr. M. L. Wolford, 328 Chestnut street, was summoned, who on arriving pronounced her dead. Coroner Eckinger was notified and the woman's body sent to her home, 1525 Derry street.

Funeral services will be held at her late home, Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Interment will be made in Shoop's Church cemetery.

### Aged Woman Dies From Injuries

Mrs. Susan Dowhower, aged 87 years, of 414 Harris street, died last night at the Harrisburg Hospital, from a fractured hip, which she received a month previous, when she fell on an icy sidewalk. At the time she was confined to the hospital.

She is survived by one son, Stephen D. Dowhower, a passenger conductor on the Pennsylvania Railroad, with whom she made her home. Funeral services will be held at the home of her son, 414 Harris street, to-morrow evening at 7.30 o'clock, the Rev. Edwin S. Rupp, pastor of the Otterbein United Brethren church, officiating. The body will be taken to Columbia Friday morning by Undertaker George Sourbier, who also interment will be made in the Columbia cemetery.

### CAVALRY HORSES

The Loads They Have to Carry in the Armies of Europe

The British cavalry is armed with the short Lee-Enfield rifle, the magazine of which holds ten rounds; the sword, which is carried by all ranks except signallers, and the revolver, carried by warrant officers, staff sergeants, trumpeters and drivers. Each trooper carries 100 rounds of ammunition in a bandolier over the left shoulder. Lance regiments carry the lance. Each cavalryman, like the infantryman, carries an emergency and the "iron" ration and a ration for his horse. Then there is the kit. Altogether the British trooper horse carries about twenty stone (280 pounds).

The regular Russian cavalry are armed with sword, rifle and bayonet, and each man carries 40 rounds of ammunition. There are the two days' oats and hay ration, a cloak and an entrenching tool. The cavalryman's kit, two days' rations, spare horse shoes, horse blanket, canvas bucket and a mess tin go to form the complete equipment and weigh together about 110 pounds. The Cossack pony carries about seventeen stone. The average weight carried by the Indian trooper horse when ready for war is about nineteen stone. The Austrian troopers carry a weight of between twenty-one and twenty-two stone, and the average in the French and German armies is about the same.—Manchester Guardian.
