Specialties were again more prominent than the active or seasoned issues at the outset of to-day's machine. Central Leather and Motor Shares made Delegates Canvassing at Shamokin for general gains, while leaders were slightly lower or unchanged. Later Bethlenem Steel and Texas Company were added to the list of higher prices, the former advancing two points. Read ing's uncertain course reflected curren gossip connected with its future divi-

gossip connected with its future dividend prospects. Some very substantial recessions were recorded by American stocks in London, notably Canadian Pacific, Reading and Union Pacific. Reading became acutely weak toward midday, declining 2 points to 142 3.8 on steady selling, much of which was ascribed to out of town sources. The balance of the list was sympathetically affected, Canadian Pacific yielding 1 5.8 with substantial declines in U. S. Steel and Amalgamated Copper. Bethlehem Steel, however, held much of its rise. Specialties fell back easily and the activities of the short interest became more pronounced. Bonds were lower.
