### PRACTICAL HEALTH HINT. Decayed Teeth. Decayed teeth cause an unclean mouth. Toothache and

frequent cause of decay of the second teeth. If a child has de-cayed teeth it cannot properly chew its food. Improperly chew ed food and an unclean mouth sequently poor general health. If a child is not in good health to contract any contagious disease, and it has not the proper chance to grow into a robust, healthy adult. If the child's teeth are decayed it should be teeth should be brushed after each meal, using a toothbrush and tooth powder. The follow-ing tooth powder is recommended: Two ounces of powdered pre-cipitated chalk, haif an ounce of powdered castile soap, one dram of powdered orris root, thor-oughly mixed. This prescription can be filled by any druggist.
