The reason is plainly given in John xx, 17, imlying that between the two appearings He had ascended and returned. What He did at His several appear-

ings during those forty days gives us a sample of what we can do in our glorified bodies. What an inspiration it should be to us to consider it! These so loved Him devoted to Him, not expecting His resurrection, had bought spices with which to anoint His dead body when the Sabbath was past, but they never did. Believing His word will prevent us from spending money unwisely. Love is in some respects the greatest, but in the matter of service it must be faith working by love (I Cor. xili, 13; Gal. v, 6).
