EASTER IN THE CHURCHES

Superb Musical Programs Were Enjoyed by Record Crowds—Large Collections Reported at St. John's

The superb Easter musical program announced by the various churches attracted record crowds to all in the borough. The services, coupled with the music, were very impressive and were featured with the rendition of difficult music by trained choirs of male voices in the First Presbyterian and the St. James' Catholic churches. At the First Reformed church, Prof. William H. Stoeneser, of the Potsdam Conservatory, New York, gave one of the finest pipe organ recitals ever heard in the borough, using Easter music especially. Large accessions were reported by a number of the churches and at St. John's Lutheran church, a collection of about \$2,000 was reported for the benefit of the church parsonage fund. The Verdi Italian band, of Harrisburg, enlivened the Easter observation in the lower and foreign districts with its first public appearance yesterday morning. The band attended services in St. Ann's church and later played a number of selections in South Third street. The Verdi band is directed by M. Caldarazzi, a former member of the Steelton band.

Palmer Hopes to Be Here In accepting the invitation to address the conferences A. Mitchell Palmer addressed the following letter to the Local Option Committee: "I shall be very glad to speak at the local option conference in the Chestnut street auditorium on Tuesday, April 6, if I can possibly arrange to be there. I am leaving home on Saturday and it may be difficult to arrange to get back to Harrisburg so soon, but I will do it if possible. Being deeply interested in the success of the Governor's plan, I am anxious to do everything I can to help."

The local option committee statement follows: "It is estimated that ten thousand supporters of the Williams county local option bill from all parts of Pennsylvania will come to Harrisburg to-morrow to participate in the demonstration in behalf of the Governor's measure. Special trains and special cars will bring the delegations to the Capitol City. The majority of these delegations have reported to headquarters that they will arrive in Harrisburg to-morrow morning in time to take part in the first conference in the Chestnut street auditorium at 10 o'clock. The hearing on the bill will take place at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon and the evening meeting will be held in the Chestnut street auditorium at 8 o'clock."

Many Special Trains "The Governor will sound the keynote of the meeting in his speech in the auditorium to-morrow evening. It will be emphasized particularly by the speakers at the conferences that local option is only another name for local self government."

"It is the plan of the committee that the program shall consist of a number of small addresses on local option. The details of this program will be determined up to-night at a conference of the committee members from all parts of the State in the Commonwealth Hotel. This meeting will be well attended, according to reports, which have been received at headquarters."

Special trains will bring delegations from Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. It is stated in Philadelphia that their delegations will number three thousand, and from Pittsburgh, it is reported, that there will be at least five hundred on the special train coming from that city. There will be special cars from Beaver, Mercer, Chester, Lycoming, Snyder, Blair, York, Montgomery, Bucks, Union, Northumberland, Jefferson, Indiana and Delaware and Washington counties. The visitors will be welcomed by a Harrisburg committee headed by E. Z. Wallower, one of the leading residents of the city. Arrangements have been made for a band, and it is likely that this band will meet delegations at the station and escort them to the auditorium. In the event that there is an overflow attendance, open air meetings will be held."

Committee Will Meet To-night The local option committee of arrangements will meet to-night at the Commonwealth hotel to complete the details of the program for to-morrow's demonstration at various points in the city. Speakers will be selected to appear before the Law and Order Committee of the House and to present the argument of the friends of local option, and those who are to make addresses before the meetings in Chestnut street hall to-morrow morning and to-morrow evening will be chosen. Governor Brumbaugh will make the principal speech in the evening. Governor Brumbaugh has sent a letter to Judges of the State and to many attorneys asking them to aid him in his fight for local option. He particularly asks those Judges who will come up for re-election in the next three years to assist in the local option work. A similar letter has been addressed to prominent attorneys throughout the State, asking them to take part in the campaign in the Legislature.

The Governor's Letter The letter of the Governor to the attorneys follows: "Your district will in the immediate future be called upon by law to elect
