representing an average daily usage of 7,751,052 gallons. The cost of pumping and filtering that water has been estimated by Commissioner Bowman at \$5.29 a million gallons.

Cash Surplus of \$90,915
 Of the more than \$32,000 saved during the year, Bowman estimates that \$27,060.71 was due to economical systems inaugurated by himself under the Clark commission form of government bill, and that \$5,425 represented the automatic reduction of interest charges. The actual cash surplus at the close of 1914, the report shows, was \$80,915.93. Water pressure at the many city fire hydrants ran from 20 to 91 pounds, although generally it averaged between 55 and 60 pounds, and that is considered to be excellent pressure.

White upwards of three billion gallons of water were pumped during the year, the department did not receive actual cash in return for all of it. Unpaid water rents at the beginning of 1915 totaled \$65,065.62, and \$46,648.31 represents water furnished to the city, public and charitable institutions and to churches.

Tests made by the city chemist showed that the filtered water always was free from "coli," the typhus and other disease germs and that lowest possible number of bacteria were found. The number of bacteria shown was not sufficient to be dangerous to health.

The Water Department's gross bonded debt on January 1, 1915, was \$463,300; there was \$263,538 in the sinking fund, and the net bonded debt, therefore, was \$199,762. The report was ordered printed.

LOPS \$32,000 OFF WATER EXPENSES

Continued From First Page.
 Commissioner Bowman said, account for the water department's general receipts being slightly less than those of the previous year when they approximated more than \$212,000. Last year they ran to something over \$207,000.

The competitive bidding system the Commissioner points to as one of the reasons for the department expenses being less than during the previous year. General reductions in the prices of water pipe and supplies were obtained through this method of buying. Besides the cost of laying water pipe was reduced anywhere from 13 to 34 cents a foot.

These and other economic steps brought the total expenses of the year down to \$126,123.28, compared with \$158,608.39 paid out during the previous twelve months. It may also be observed from the report that no fewer than 2,324,485,600 gallons of water were pumped and filtered during 1914.
