London, April 9, 4.31 A. M .- Italian steamers in American ports have been ordered to postpone all sailings until April 20, according to a Rome dispatch to the Exchange Telegram Company.

Geneva, via Paris, April 9 .- Railroad rolling stock is being withdrawn by Italy from the Swiss frontier, it is re ported here, for the transportation of troops and military stores in Northern Italy, destined for the region bordering on the Austrian Tyrol.
