BILL ABOLISHING CAPITAL PUNISHMENT HAS A FLAW

Amends the Hanging Law Which Has Been Repealed in Favor of Electrocution, and It Must Be Changed Before Committee Can Act

The Geiser measure introduced in the for the abolition of capital punishment and making the punishment for murder imprisonment for life, is yet in the hands of the Judician, General Committee, which finds that it will have to be amended before it can be reported. The fact that it needs amending, commit

amended before it can be reported. The fact that it needs amending, committeemen say, does not signify necessarily that it will be reported favorably.

The Geiser bill comes as an amendment to the act of March 31, 1880, which provided for death by hanging. This act was repeated by the act of June 13, 1913, which provides that the death penalty in this State shall be electrocution. As a consequence the Geiser bill seeks to amend an act which already has been repealed.

The Geiser measure recalled to members of the Legislature to-day the fact that some weeks ago hundreds of little green paper slips were distributed in the legislative halls protesting against the abolition of capital punishment. This "distracture" was signed by the "Civic Alliance," which, it is stated, has headquarters in Boston, Mass.
