### BAKER IS UNDECIDED

Home Run King Returns to Farm and Matter Rests

Philadelphia, April 16.—"Home Run" Baker did not report to Connie Mack yesterday, and the latter said there were no further developments in the matter. Baker is supposed to have gone to his home in Trappe, Md., to think over the talk he had with Manager Mack on Wednesday. He is still undecided.

Having no fault to find with the work of Eddie Murphy at third base in the two games with the Red Sox, Manager Mack is not worrying any more about Baker than he was during the winter. Connie would be pleased to have Baker return to the team, but has not asked him to come back, because Baker retired of his own will and Connie expects him to return the same way, without any extra inducements.

Just what cognizance the National Commission would take in Baker's case is not known. Baker notified Mack that he was through with baseball, and accepting the decision as final, Mack did not order J. Franklin to report. Therefore, Baker has violated no baseball law, and it is doubtful if he will have to receive permission from the National Commission to play. There will be no trouble in this respect if Baker makes up his mind to return.
