LIQUOR LAWS VIOLATED? COURT ORDERS INQUIRY

On the Statement of a Mercersburg Clergyman, Judge Gillan Directs Grand Jury to Investigate Alleged Drunkenness Among Minors.

Chambersburg, April 27.—The Franklin county Grand Jury here at the present session of criminal court was directed yesterday to investigate charges made by the Rev. William Frederick Bald, a Mercersburg clergyman, who has written the Judge, saying that hotelmen in and around Mercersburg have been in the habit of furnishing in-alcantans to minors.

This court order came as a surprise, notwithstanding the fact that it had been known here that complaints were to be registered against alleged violations of the liquor laws.

The clergyman's letter to the Judge was not read in open court, although it is said that the complainant gave the names of several boys whom he charges he accosted on the street while they were dazed and staggering from drunkenness.

FIGHT FILMS BARRED

Newark Custom Officials Refuse to Sanction Johnson-Willard Pictures

Newark, N. J., April 27.—The Federal customs officers refused a formal demand for permission to show in this city moving pictures of the Johnson-Willard fight at Havana.

The demand was made by Charles A. Towne, formerly a Senator of the United States, and Benjamin F. Spellman upon the Collector of the Port of Newark. The attorneys announced that in a day or two they would apply to the Federal District Court for an injunction restraining the customs authorities from prohibiting the pictures.
