If organized ball, or at least Manager MeGraw, of the New York club, has made a mistake. There isn't a chance for MeGraw to play Kauff, because he not only is tied up to a Brooklyn federal League team by a straight iron-bound contract, but he is an outlawed player, according to the rules of organized ball, and New York couldn't use him without breaking the agreement under which they operate."

President Gilmore said that immediate steps had been taken through New York attorneys to prevent Kauff from playing should the New York club attempt to start him in a game.

"I am glad to see President Tener at take the stand he did in the matter," in Gilmore added, "for it would be a bad thing for the game if he allowed such a thing to be done."
