#### BENNY KAUFF SUSPENDED BY PRESIDENT GILMORE

Brooklyn Federal Leaguer Who Jumped to New York Giants Is Occupying Baseball Stage To-day—Hope For Reinstatement

By Associated Press. New York, April 30.—Whether the national commission will reinstate Benny Kauff, or whether the National League will order him returned to the Brooklyn club of the Federal League, were the big questions in the mind of every baseball fan in New York to-day.

Kauff's jump from the Brooklyn club to the New York National League club five minutes before the New York-Boston National League game, was started yesterday proved a bombshell for the baseball world when President Gaffney, of the Boston Braves, refused to allow his club to play the Giants with Kauff in the field for the home club.

Mr. Gaffney contends that Kauff is "an outlaw" so far as organized baseball is concerned because of his original jump to the Federal League.

Manager McGraw, of the New York club, admitted to-day that Kauff would have to be reinstated by the National Commission as a condition to his playing in the National League.

Kauff was suspended by the Federal League president after a conference over the long distance telephone with Robert E. Ward, president of the Brooklyn club, to which Kauff belonged.



if organized ball, or at least Manager McGraw, of the New York club, has made a mistake. There isn't a chance for McGraw to play Kauff, because he not only is tied up by a straight iron-bound contract, but he is an outlawed player, according to the rules of organized ball, and New York couldn't use him without breaking the agreement under which they operate.

President Gilmore said that immediate steps had been taken through New York attorneys to prevent Kauff from playing should the New York club attempt to start him in a game.

#### FIRE LADDIES TO PARADE

Good Will and Shamrock Companies Will March to Island For Game

A regular out and out firemen's parade will precede the baseball contest between the Good Will and Shamrock Fire Companies which will take place to-morrow afternoon on the H. A. C. field. The game will be called at 3 o'clock when the pent up energy which has been gathering since the game was scheduled will break loose.

The fact that both companies will parade to the island back of their baseball representatives will assure a partisan audience which will make things merry. The players in uniform will be carried over the route of the parade and to the island in automobiles. The West End band will furnish music. The Shamrocks will start the parade from its fire house at Eighteenth and Herz streets, going to the Good Will house at Sixth and Calder streets, to pick up their rivals, the procession will move up Sixth to Hamilton, to Third, to Market, to Second, to Walnut and then to the ball park.

Free Baseball at Decatur Decatur, Ill., April 30.—As the opening day is a league holiday, an admission charge had to be made for the Three-I opening game yesterday but to-day Decatur becomes the only league town in the country with free baseball. About \$3,500 has been given by enthusiasts and business men, and this, with other sources of revenue, is expected to support the team for the season.

### NO ACTION BY GILMORE

Will Await Developments in Case of Benny Kauff  
Chicago, April 30.—President Gilmore refused yesterday afternoon to comment on Benny Kauff's jump to the Giants further than to say he felt like complimenting Tener and President Gaffney on their stand in declining to permit Kauff to play. The Federal League would protect its interests, he declared, but before taking action would await further information on the subject.

Kauff, who was with Indianapolis last year, this season signed with the Brooklyn Federals, accepting \$1,500 advance money for signing a three-year contract, according to Gilmore. There was no ten-day clause in his contract.

### MERKLE DISLOCATES ARM

Giants' First Sacker Out of Game for Several Weeks  
New York, April 30.—Fred Merkle, first baseman of the New York National League club, fell in trying to field a wild throw by Marquard in the sixth inning of yesterday's game and dislocated his left arm. It was at first thought the arm was broken. The injury, however, is likely to keep him out of the game for several weeks.

Manager McGraw said last night that Snodgrass probably would play first base to-day, although that player has recently been laid up with a sore wrist.

James Thorpe, the Olympic champion, was released by the Giants yesterday to the Jersey City International League club under an optional agreement. He has been with the Giants the last two seasons.

### BURMAN WINS AUTO RACE

Captures 200-mile Southwest Sweepstakes in 2 Hours, 56 Min., 3.5 Sec.  
Oklahoma City, Okla., April 30.—Bob Burman yesterday afternoon won the 200-mile Southwest sweepstakes automobile road race for a purse of \$5,000. His time was 2 hours, 56 minutes and 3.5 seconds.

Dave Lewis was second and John Raimey third. Lewis finished one minute, 28.5 seconds after Burman. Raimey was two laps and Hearne three behind the two leaders at the finish.

Burman took the lead from Lewis on the 68th lap and his advantage was increased slightly three laps later when Lewis ran off the course, losing 20 seconds.
