

Surety Losses Paid Under Extraordinary Circumstances

Not only must the slow maturity of a surety company's obligations be ken into account by the successful surety underwriter, but the extraordi-try and anforescen character of some of its risks must be given careful

unry and inforescen character of some of its risks must be given careful consideration.

In one case'n surety company on a hond of \$2,000, renewed for a second term, was held liable for a total shortage of \$13,000.

In still another case the surety on a bond for \$1,000 for a single term was held liable for \$3,000. (Grobarger v. Surety Co., 102 S. W. 873.)

On a fidelity bond for \$2,500, dated December 8, 1004, and subsequently renewed annually until December, 1008, a surety company has been held liable, ten years after the bond was given, for over \$3,500. (Alex. Campbell Milk Co. v. Surety Co., 103 App. 101v. 738.)

On a bond given for the faithful performance of his duties by an assignee for the benefit of creditors a surety company was held liable and had to pay \$30,000 caused by a loss by fire occurring in a factory ten days after the appointment of the assignee. (Hill v. Surety Co., 107 Wis. 10.)

In indiana, in 1902, a surety company furnished one of its own forms of dielity boads for the cashier of a bask. Eleven years afterward, in 1913, the Indiana Supreme Court held the surety to be liable not in accordance with the terms of the boad which it had furnished but in accordance with the much broader terms of a State statute. (Surety Co. et al. v. Poetker, 102 N. E. 373.)
