No papers will be published except the Popolo Romano, the conservative organ which employs non-union workmen.

Meetings will be held in all the large towns of Italy and troops will be held in readiness to prevent disorders. The authorities fear there may be clashes between workmen favoring Italy's intervention in the war and those who hope for a continuation of neutrality.
