1.310 Passengers on the Lusitania Alone Will Brave Dangers of German Blockade

#### **CAUTION NOTICE** FAILS IN EFFECT

Number of Passengers on the Lusitan ia Warned in Telegrams Not to Sail. Saying the Liner Was to Be Torpedoed by Submarines

New York, May 1.-The largest number of trans-Atlantic travelers to spring had booked passage on six big liners leaving port to-day. The Lusi-tania alone had aboard nearly 900 cab-in passengers and a large number in the steerage.

Apparently the notice published in

Apparently the notice published in newspapers over the signature of the imperial German embassy, reminding passengers that vessels flying the flags of the allies are liable to destruction in the war zone around the British Isles, had no effect on the traveling public. There were the usual number of last-minute cancellations, but no more than customary, it was said at the various steamship offices. In the absence of authentic figures, it was estimated that more than 3,000 persons had reserved sailings to-day.

When the Lusitania sailed she had aboard 1,310 passengers. A number of the passengers received telegrams at the pier, signed by names unknown to them and presumed to be fictitious, advising them not to sail, as the liner was to be torpedoed by submarines. ## ZEEBRUGGE, BASE OF THE SUBMARINES, IS SHELLED

Amsterdam, May 1 .- The "Telegraaf'' publishes a dispatch saying that the town of Zeebrugge, in Belgium, on the North Sea, has been heavily bombarded. Zeebrugge is a base of the German submarine flotilla.

Zeebrugge is the port of Bruges and it came into German possession when Belgium was invaded. It is 12 miles to the northeast of Ostend and the same distance from the Holland boundary. Zeebrugge was constructed as a harbor about ten years ago at a cost of \$8,000,000. Its large outer harbor communicates with a smaller inner basin at the beginning of the new Maritime Canal which allows seagoing vessels to reach Bruges.
