GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS BILL CARRIES \$32,497,406

The general appropriations bill is on its way through the House, being reported out last night by Chairman Woodward. It carries a total of \$32,497,406, which is about \$5,000,000 less than for the two preceding years and well within the revenues, according to the way the Woodward committee has figured it out.

If there are no after-discovered big items to tack on to the bill, it will fall for less than any bill of a similar character in a number of years. The total this year is hardly a fair comparison with the sum of two years ago, which carried with it funds for the State Highway Department and for the tuberculosis division of the State Health Department, all of which this year will be cared for in separate bills.

APPROVES LONGER HOURS FOR WOMEN HOTEL WORKERS

The House last night passed finally the Senate bill lengthening the hours of labor for women in hotels, restaurants and boarding houses to 63 a week, thereby practically exempting that class of female labor from the women's working hours act which was passed in the last session of the General Assembly. Mr. Maurer, the Socialist member, from Berks, opposed the passage of the bill.

The only new bit of highway to be made part of the state system, through legislation at this session, despite the fact that hundreds of such bills were introduced or proposed, is a four-mile stretch in Adams county near Gettysburg, a part of the road over which the Southern army retreated after the battle there. A bill providing for this stretch of state highway was passed in the House last night.

A bill which would hold railroads responsible for fire, which result from sparks from locomotives, was defeated by a vote of 23 to 104. The Swartz bill making the Public Service Commission a Bureau of the Department of Internal Affairs was amended on third reading last evening and laid over for printing.
