SIXTY TENNIS PLAYERS IN RESERVOIR PARK CLUB

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Socialists Now Oppose Italy's Going into War Rome, May 10, Via Paris, May 11.—Although negotiations with the central empire still are pending and there is a bare possibility the influence of former Premier Giolitti may avert war, military preparations pointing to Austria as an inevitable antagonist are so thorough and vigorous that a conflict seems unavoidable. Even discussions among the opposition parties have virtually ceased. Only the irreconcilable Socialists whose deputies met in the chamber to-day, still oppose Italy's participation in the war and their attitude is believed to be guided more by a desire for consistency than because of opposition to a war.

Marine Rate Up 75 Points New York, May 11.—Marine insurance rates have advanced from 75 to 100 points since the Lusitania was sunk. A rate of 2 1/2 per cent. on cargoes destined for London, 2 per cent. for Liverpool and 1 1/2 per cent. for Glasgow prevailed yesterday. It was said the upward tendency had been checked and policies were being freely offered at these rates.

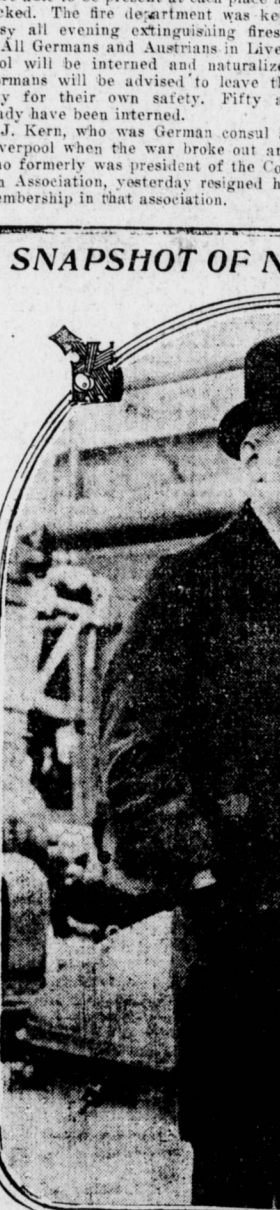
RUSSIANS CLAIM VICTORY IN THE UZSOK PASS REGION

Petrograd, May 11, 7.03 A. M.—An official statement issued last night by General Headquarters said: "In the region of Uzsook pass the enemy made a fruitless attack on Saturday. The enemy columns attacked impetuously a position held by two of our companies in a sector of the Javorina mountain chain on the slopes above Lomnitsa. The enemy's losses were so heavy heaps of bodies interfered with the fire from our trenches. Our troops, in spite of the enemy's machine gun fire, left their trenches and swept the enemy from the whole region.

AMERICANS IN URUMIAH, PERSIA, REPORTED SAFE

Washington, May 11.—Assurances from the Turkish government that Americans in Urumiah, Persia, where bandit uprisings were reported some weeks ago, were safe reached the State Department yesterday in a cablegram from Ambassador Morgenthau at Constantinople.
