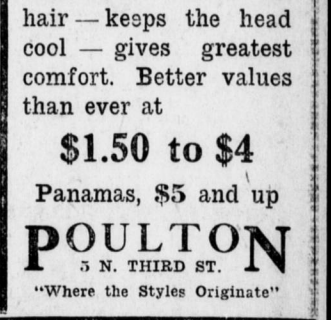
TO HAVE COUNTY CONVENTION

ARSENAL MEASURE IS PASSED Wildman Bill Carries \$72,000 for Completion of Improvements The Swartz bill repealing the law regulating examination and licensing of engineers of stationary engines in third class cities was defeated in the House last night by a vote of 89 yeas and 48 nays, 104 affirmative votes being necessary to passage. The Wildman bill appropriating \$72,000 for the completion of the State arsenal improvements was passed finally.
