

# LUTRERAN FEDERATION LINK

The Susquehanna Synod Is First to Favor Movement to Unite All Branches

Selinsgrove, May 15 .- First link in the proposed federation of all the Lutheran churches in the United States was forged here yesterday in the forty eighth annual convention of the Suseight athuai convention of the Susquehanna Synod when that body unanimously favored the movement.
