COAL AT PANAMA

Mammoth Storage Plants Planned for the Canal Route Coal-storing plants of mammoth magnitude are being planned on the Panama canal route. One of the storage plants is to be situated at Cristobal and another at Balboa. It is planned to have a coal storage basin at Cristobal, with a capacity of 290,000 tons, and one at Balboa, with a capacity of 160,000 tons. In each place the storage will be within a large basin made of re-enforced concrete, in which approximately half of the coal will be stored under water for use in time of war and the other half above water to be added to and taken from continually for the ordinary uses of commercial and government vessels. It also is planned, if the policy should be approved, to be able to lease parts of the storage basin to such private coal companies as may wish to maintain their own coal stores on the isthmus, but in such cases all of the handling will be done by the government plant, a suitable charge being made for the service.—New York Press.

Size of Zeppelins

Zeppelins vary in diameter and length, but most of them are of large size, being almost as big as battleships. The Deutschland, for example, is 485 feet long and 46 feet in diameter, with a capacity of 25,000 cubic yards and a lifting power of 44,000 pounds.
