Third. The several school boards of the Third. The several school boards of the county, after examination of the various books which may have been submitted, to hold a meeting at which each director shall make out a list of the books which he prefers to have adopted in the county, and se d it to Henry Meyer, Esq., County Superin n dent, Rebersburg, Pa., prior to the first day of June, 1879, who shall make several statements so sent, and the books upon the various branches having the ighest number of votes or preference shall be the series recommended for county uniformity.
