Friday was observed "as a day of fasting and prayer for the temperance work and workers of our country." The following topics were recommended by the Woman's National Temperance Union:

"Morning Hour.—Thanksgiving for the wonderful change God hath wrought in temperance sentiment in three past years, and for the saved men and redeemed homes of our land. Noon Hour.—That the Christian men and women of the land shall be brought to see the unparalleled evil of intemperance in its true light, and, realizing its enormity, use their influence and their efforts for its suppression. 1 to 2 p. m.—For the Press, that it may become one of the most powerful of God's instrumentalities for the advancement of the temperance cause. 2 to 3 p. m.—That the hearts of all those who are engaged in this 'traffic in human souls' be changed, and the wickedness of the business be made manifest to them. 3 to 4 p. m.—For the legal aspect of temperance reform, that our voters and lawmakers may be faithful to their trust in respect to Temperance legislation. 4 to 5 p. m.—For the spread of Temperance truths and principles, and for the continual outpouring of God's Holy Spirit upon our work and workers."

General Garfield's nomination by acclamation of United States Senator by the Republicans for the Ohio Legislature is a splendid tribute to one of the truest men in American politics to-day. General Garfield represents the best element in the party which is and must be the hope of the country, and his unanimous nomination, putting aside all thought of the personal distinction designed for him, is a proof of the instinct with which the Republican party in stirring periods seeks the leadership of its best men. When it is remembered what distinguished Republicans have been proposed as candidates for the place to which General Garfield has been chosen without a dissenting voice, the honor seems to be great indeed. Considered in its Presidential significance, this must be regarded as a handsome gain for Secretary Sherman, especially as one of the candidates mentioned against the General was an ardent Grant man.

A correspondent of the *Christian Intelligencer*, the Rev. J. A. De Baun, D. D., beginning with the announcement that "several biblical scholars and theologians of most respectable standing are pronouncing the opening chapters of Genesis to be unhistorical," examines the matter at length, and comes to the following conclusions:

"The Book of Genesis is history divinely certified as to its accuracy. There is no divine intimation that its apparent plain and simple record of first things is parenthetical to its general historical character, and there is no divine warning to look for a hidden meaning. The only reasonable interpretation of the history of the first things in Genesis is the plain historical interpretation."

According to the *Washington Star* (Rep.) the President said in a conversation a day or two ago that he believed that under the Constitution the Vice-President of the United States had the right to count and declare the Presidential vote, and whether he counted it and declared it in the rotunda of the Capitol or in presence of both Houses of Congress in joint convention assembled that he [the President] would recognize and enforce it as the true and legal declaration of the count.

The Maine outrage was consummated yesterday in the organization of the Legislature by the counted-in members. The Republicans took no part and claim that there was not a quorum voting, but what does Garcelon care for that, he has disregarded the opinion of the Supreme Court, and the will of the people.

Luke Pryor has been appointed U. S. Senator from Alabama to fill vacancy occasioned by death of Senator Huston.

Text Book Uniformity.

RESULT WHERE BOOKS HAVE TO STAND ON THEIR OWN MERIT.

At a Convention of School Directors, of Centre County, held at Bellefonte, December 26, 1878, pursuant to the call of H. Meyer, Esq., County Superintendent, for the purpose of considering the propriety of taking measures to secure a uniformity of the text-books used in the schools of said county, the following action was taken, over fifty directors being present and nearly all the district in the county being represented:

COPY OF MINUTES.

Upon motion of C. P. Stonerod, of Snow Shoe township, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS: Great expense and waste are frequently incurred by the present and constantly changing variety of text-books used in the common schools of Centre county, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the representative directors here in session, that a system of text-books, suitable, complete and uniform, be adopted in accordance with the laws of the State, throughout the county.

Upon motion of J. C. P. Jones, the following plan was adopted with but one dissenting vote, to carry into effect the following preamble and resolutions:

First. The various publishing houses to send samples of their books to each school board in the county for examination and to submit therewith the lowest exchange, introductory and wholesale prices, and the length of time they will guarantee to furnish them at said price.

Second. No agent of any publishing house to be permitted to do any work in the county, to be either general or local agent, beyond sending his books and terms as above stated. Any house or agent violating this understanding, their books to be counted out of the contest.

Third. The several school boards of the county, after examination of the various books which may have been submitted, to hold a meeting at which each director shall make out a list of the books which he prefers to have adopted in the county, and send it to Henry Meyer, Esq., County Superintendent, at Rebersburg, Pa., prior to the first day of June, 1879, who shall make the several statements so sent, and the books upon the various branches having the highest number of votes or preference shall be the series recommended for county uniformity.

The County Superintendent, after having made the above canvass as above, to send the result of the same to each of the papers in the county for publication.
