CRYSTAL LODGE ANNIVERSARY.—Last evening was the fifth anniversary of Crystal Lodge, K. of H. of this borough, and the occasion was rendered memorable by very interesting exercises. The large hall in which the Lodge meets was well filled—some two hundred members and invited guests being present. Dictator Dr. D. L. PRATT, was master of ceremonies. After singing the opening ode of the Order, Rev. Doctor STEWART offered prayer, which was followed by an address of welcome, couched in most appropriate and fitting words, by the Dictator, Rev. C. H. WRIGHT delivered a carefully prepared address, descriptive of the Order, its aims and objects, and was listened to with attention and evident interest, by the brethren and guests. Past Dictator BOWMAN, of Loyal Sock Lodge, being in the audience, made some timely remarks. There was sincere regret expressed on account of the indisposition of Brother KITTRIDGE, which prevented him from giving an interesting history of Crystal Lodge; no one is better qualified for such an office, as Mr. K. has always taken a deep interest in everything pertaining to the order and lodge, and is probably better posted on the subject than any other member in this section. Mr. S. W. RODGERS gave some interesting statistics and information, and read a beautiful little poem founded on the mystic monogram, "O. M. A." But the most eloquent and convincing arguments to the great and good work being accomplished and the rapid growth of the beneficent order, were the figures on the walls, proclaiming in golden characters that over \$2,170,000 has been paid to the widows and orphans of deceased brothers; that in seven years 2,000 lodges have been instituted, with an aggregate membership of 70,000. In five years Crystal lodge has grown from ten members to sixty.

Mrs. BALDWIN and Miss SMITH kindly added to the pleasure of the audience by exhibitions of their vocal powers. They are both

good vocalists and did themselves credit and won the applause of all present.

When the "feast of reason" had subsided, the sisters of Mystic lodge spread a bountiful collation to which all present did ample justice. At eleven o'clock the party began to disperse, feeling that "it had been good for them to be there."

The entertainment cannot fail of good results to Crystal lodge, as many of our most intelligent and refined citizens were present.

January 13.—Visited the following schools: Towanda, Scott's, Laura McGill; Nail Works, Clayton Osborn; Wysox, Fairview, F. A. Thompson; Laning, Cynthia Bull.

Scott's school is small but interest and good work manifest. Mr. Osborn has a large school, and is succeeding finely. He ought to have power to compel a number of larger boys—not pupils—to attend school, who spend most of the day riding down hill near the school house—or better, we should have a compulsory law. Mr. Thompson is a thoro. teacher and good disciplinarian—well adapted to the charge of some Graded School. His drill of small pupils in reading, and on large finely colored wall maps of Bradford county, and Wysox twp., made by pupils, was excellent. A much larger attendance than usual at the Laning school, is the best evidence of the success of the teacher.
