To-morrow will be the 194th anniversary of the birth of FRANKLIN.

A new Episcopal diocese is proposed to be erected out of a portion of Central Pennsylvania, and to be composed of the counties of Lycoming, Clinton, Centre, Tioga, Potter, Northumberland, Montour, Columbia, Union and Snyder. These counties now, by canon, form the convocation of Williamsport, and if the proposition is favorably acted upon, the diocese will probably be known as that of Williamsport.
