The President has appointed James Russell Lowell, Minister to England, and J. W. Foster, of Indiana, Minister to Russia.


Fred M. Spalding, ex-City Clerk of Leavenworth, Kas., has been sentenced to four and a half years' imprisonment for embezzlement.






