DAVID LUTHER and DAVID STROPE contributed the lumber, and other sympathizing neighbors joined together and put up a new house for the unfortunate man, and the entire neighborhood will unite in a house-warming donation party for the family on Tuesday afternoon and evening next.

A. G. CRANMER died at his residence in Monroe, on Tuesday afternoon. Although just in the prime of manhood, he had been a prominent business man for many years. The deceased leaves a wife and one son to mourn his loss. He was a generous hearted useful citizen, and his loss will be severely felt in the community where he lived. Mr. CRANMER was an active and conspicuous member of the Masonic fraternity, and will be buried tomorrow, with the honors of the Order.

In another column will be noted the death of the wife of the well-known citizen, Mr. S. C. GAYLORD. The lady went to Gillett about the first of January, to visit her father, Dr. COLES, and a few days thereafter had the misfortune to slip, injuring herself so seriously as to cause results that led to her death. She was about twenty-five years of age, the light of her home, and greatly beloved by all, and her death will be the cause of deep sorrow. She was attended by Drs. SQUIRE and WEY, of this city.—*Elmira Advertiser*.

Our townsman, Mr. JOHNSON, inventor of the Ross Fanning Mill, has exhibited to us another invention of his, which we have no doubt will prove very useful. It is a device for starting heavily loaded street cars, and Mr. J. claims it will accomplish the purpose with a saving of seventy-five per cent. of the draft required by the old method. He has sent a model to the Patent Office and expects a patent on it in due time. The subject has occupied the attention and thoughts of street railway men for a long time, and we learn that as high as \$20,000 have been offered by one company for a "starter," which will accomplish what is claimed for this one. We hope it may prove all that is anticipated for it.

Suicide of Henry Jones.

HE SHOOTS HIMSELF WITH A SHOT-GUN.

HENRY JONES, a blacksmith, residing in the 1st Ward, complained of feeling unwell yesterday, and did not go to his work. During the day he borrowed a gun from Mr. GEIGER for the purpose, as he said, of shooting rats. He left his house about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and did not return; but supposing he had gone to his father's, on the other side of the river, his wife was not alarmed by his absence. This morning she sent to his father's house to see if he was there, and learned that they had seen nothing of him. His father came over to town and commenced a search for him. About 11 o'clock his lifeless body was found in the old cooper shop on Second street—near the College. He had placed the muzzle of the gun in his mouth and discharged it. The lead passed through the roof of the mouth, lodging in the skull, leaving no scars on the surface.

The deceased was an industrious, steady man, and had a good situation in the blacksmith shop at the Barclay shops, and no cause is assigned for the rash deed, and it is supposed that he was laboring under a fit of temporary insanity. He had told a fellow workman that he intended to kill himself.

The deceased was a son of JACOB JONES, and leaves a wife and two children, one of them only two weeks old.

A brother of the suicide died very suddenly some years ago, under circumstances which led to the belief that he had taken his own life, but the matter was never investigated.
