Superintendent's Notes.

January 21 and 22.—Visited the following schools and teachers of Albany township: Corbin Hill, Frank Vanloon; Hilbard Hill, Blanche Babcock; Bahr, A. A. Armstrong; Kellogg, Russell Fowler; Corson Hill, Ada Chamberlain; Laddsborg, Mazie Kline; Waltman Hill, George Patterson; Moon Street, Mary McKernan. Directors Richards, J. Hested, H. Corson and B. Allen accompanied to different schools, showing much interest and a desire to know which are the best teachers, that only such may be employed in their schools. Mr. Corson had already visited most of the schools of the township. Mr. Hested being an old teacher will prove an excellent director. The schools of this township with the exception of Moon street, which is largely worthless, are doing excellent work, and the people ought to be abundantly satisfied. The teacher at Corbin Hill, though young, is yet a veteran in management and work. Unless the male teachers of the township spur up, the lady teachers will distance them in government. Miss Kline is one of the most energetic, hard-working teachers in the county, and will have to economize strength by talking and working less, and making pupils do more, or she will be unable to teach next summer. Hibbard and Corson Hill are number one schools. Bahr and Kellogg have finely qualified, thorough teachers. All the schools number from 30 to 50 pupils.

The jury of inquest summoned to view the dead body of HENRY JONES, made the following return:

COMMONWEALTH OF PENN'A. } S. S.
COUNTY OF BRADFORD. }

At an inquisition indented and taken at the Borough of Towanda, in the County of Bradford, on the 22d day of January, 1880, before me, W. J. YOUNG, one of the Justices of the Peace in and for said County and State, acting Coroner in the county aforesaid, upon the view of the dead body of HENRY JONES, then and there lying dead, upon the oaths of W. W. KEELER, A. C. STEWART, L. FINCH, B. E. ALDRICH, E. B. PIERCE and JAMES BULL, good and lawful men of the county aforesaid, who being sworn and affirmed to inquire on the part of the Commonwealth, when, where, how and after what manner the said HENRY JONES, aforesaid, came to

his death, do say, upon their oaths and affirmations, that the said HENRY JONES, did on the 21st day of January, 1880, at the Borough of Towanda, in the County of Bradford, commit suicide, by shooting himself in the mouth with a shot-gun.

In witness whereof the said Justice as well as said Jurors have hereunto set their hands and seals.
