The Elmira Free Press learns that a few prominent citizens of Blossburg met at the office of R. B. FREEMAN, Esq., to consider the advisability of erecting from the eastern portion of Tioga and western portion of Bradford counties a new county, defining the western boundary to begin at a point on the line of New York and Pennsylvania, about five miles west of Lawrenceville, running south about five miles distant from the Tioga river parallel thereto to the western boundary of Liberty township, continuing thence to Lycoming county, thence east to a point five miles east of the Northern Central railway, thence north in a line five miles east of said Northern Central railway to the aforesaid New York and Pennsylvania state line, thence along said line to the place of beginning, locating the county seat at Blossburg, as being the place most accessible for the general public. The case is to be more fully considered at some future time.

Warren, Dunham, Helen Farnham; Bowen, Lina Decker; Warrenham, Mary Cunningham; Sleeper Hill, Libbie Baker; Center, F. Brown; Whalen, G. M. Frisbie; Shingle, Lillie Brainard; Union, J. C. Williams. Maple Grove and LeRaysville have experienced and thorough teachers, and are doing well, as is also the Wells. The people and patrons of Neath may well appreciate their excellent graded school. Director G. W. Talmadge considers the Dunham, Brown and Warrenham schools satisfactory—writing is neglected in them.
