"Not guilty, but to pay the costs," in cases where defendants are charged with grave and infamous crimes, seems to us an inexcusable verdict, and yet twelve men, who listened for several days to testimony and arguments, in the case of the Commonwealth vs. VANN and VARGASON, charged with burning a barn containing a large amount of hay, grain, &c., and a pair of valuable horses, returned such a verdict on Sunday morning. We are at a loss to conceive how sensible men can arrive at such a conclusion. If the accused were guilty, they deserved to be severely punished, but if they were innocent of the offense charged, it is cruel to stigmatize them by bringing in such a verdict.
