THE LAW.—By an act of Assembly approved April 22, 1873, the following has been made the law in regard to holidays which fall on Sunday: "Whenever the first day of January, twenty-second day of February, the fourth day of July, the twenty-fifth day of December, shall either of them occur on Sunday, the following day, Monday, shall be deemed and declared a public holiday; and all bills of exchange, bank checks, drafts or promissory notes falling due on either of the Mondays so observed as a holiday, shall be due and payable on the Saturday preceding such holidays, and such Mondays so observed shall for all purposes whatever, as regards the presenting for payment or acceptance, and of the protesting and giving notice of the dishonor of bills of exchange, bank checks, drafts and promissory notes, and after the passage of this act, be treated and considered as is the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday.

Superintendent's Notes.

February 16, 17, 18, 19, 20.—Visited the following schools: *Doty Hill*, Independent, T. E. Lain, accompanied by director B. F. Parell; Cain, Thomas Donivan. *South Creek*, Thompson Hill, Ira Parsons. *Springfield*, Turnpike, Alice Watson; Big Pond, Hannah Beckwith; Harkness, Willis Roeser; Crowell, Justin Storch; Upper Valley, Mary Jones; Lower Valley, Ella Savage; Leona, M. M. Bullock; Lower Leona, Judah Tracy. Directors G. Burnham, H. Fay, and O. G. Dunbar, accompanied by their respective schools. Baldwin, Green Mountain, Cain, Turnpike, Big Pond, Crowell, Upper Valley, and Lower Leona schools are especially good.

At the solicitation of many teachers, the Superintendent's notes, which were shortened to mere mention of visitation, to not occupy too much space, are made to contain additional matter, most of which occurred during visitations.

Mr. Roe was doing very commendable work in testing and drilling pupils on the multiplication table by the following:

The numbers are thus arranged on the wall, and pupils are required to repeat or write on the board the products of the numbers in the first column by either digit in the second. The plan is better than questioning; for it saves talking on the part of the teacher, and enables him to find out what particular combination the pupils fail on. The pupil can then study this combination instead of rambling over what he already knows.

Reduce 1-4 to a decimal, and give reason of rule. The methods of explaining this rule in most arithmetics are objectionable, as the operation used in explaining is quite different from that ordinarily used and required by the rule. Analysis—Annexing two ciphers to the numerator multiplies the fraction by 100; dividing now by 4, the quotient 25, is 100 times too large. Pointing off as many decimal places as ciphers annexed divides the quotient by 100, and corrects the error. The above

conforms strictly to the wording of the rule, and to our practice.

Teach pupils not to use *ought* for *naught* or zero.

So teach as to prepare the large pupils of our schools to teach.

Have such large pupils watch and learn the methods used in different exercises of the school, and our schools will become training schools for preparing teachers.
