### The News Condensed.

Out of 689 judges of election chosen in Philadelphia on Tuesday last, 515 are Republicans.

The illness of the wife of President Diaz will seriously interfere with the festivities in honor of General Grant.

Gen. Grant and party arrived in the City of Mexico last night. They were enthusiastically received.

The President will send a special message to Congress, taking strong grounds in favor of the Monroe doctrine.

Years ago Rev. Wm. Cowley was the chaplain on Blackwell's Island; he will go there now as a convict.

Thirty-four Indian boys and girls were baptised at St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church, Carlisle, recently.

Hon. Simon Cameron will be eighty-one years old on the 8th of March, and is as lively as he was a quarter of a century ago.

The San Francisco Board of Health has condemned the Chinese quarter and it is probable the place will be cleared out before long.

John Roach is laying the keel for a new ship for the Ocean Steamship Company, the length of which vessel will be three hundred and twenty feet.

The Empress of Russia was asleep in another part of the Winter Palace when the explosion took place. She has been informed of the affair, but her health has not suffered. There is an extra guard over the palace.

Dr. Bush, of New York, Secretary of the American Board of Foreign Missions, delivered a lecture in Albany yesterday and soon afterwards expired. His death is attributed to rheumatism of the heart.

New York Chamber of Commerce have talked over a plan for a monument in Wall street to commemorate the inauguration of Washington. The matter was referred to a committee.

The Virginia Senate by a vote of 23 to 7, all the members being present and each voting with his party, passed the debt bill agreed upon by the Readjuster caucus.

All the employes of Bowers, Durr & Co., at Wilmington, have agreed not to use any of the tobacco made by Pierre Lorillard, because of the attempt of the latter to enforce unpleasant regulations upon his workmen.

Dr. J. B. Craft, a prominent physician of Pike county, died at his home, near Milford, on Friday night. He was known throughout Wayne, Pike and Monroe counties as a leading homoeopathist, and was a contributor to the medical journals. His age was seventy years.

Hanlan offers to put up \$2,000 that he can beat any man in the world five seconds in a five-mile race on Toronto Bay, the race to take place in June or July, and has deposited \$500 forfeit as an earnest of the genuineness of the offer.

Charles Kase, a young journalist of considerable celebrity, is dying at the home of his father in Warren county, New Jersey. He was known to newspaper readers as "Karl." He got up the sensation of the wild animals in Central Park, New York, which attracted such widespread attention a few years ago.

At Wilkesbarre, last Saturday, Michael Burke notified the authorities that his

wife had fallen down stairs and sustained fatal injuries. An inquest was held, and the fact was revealed that her death was caused by violence at the hands of her husband. Burke was arrested.

A large Broadway warehouse near White st., N. Y., was burned Friday night, and the roof fell in while the firemen were at work upon it. All but two escaped, but their escape was the narrowest possible. The two who lost their lives were plunged into the mass of flames raging in the interior of the building. The total loss of property is estimated at \$850,000, a large part of which is covered by insurance.
