The News Condensed.

The Catholics of Pittsburg raised \$9,000 for distressed Ireland.

Philadelphia continues to complain of a supply of impure water.

Live potato bugs have made their appearance in Chester.

It is given out in tobacco regions that the plant this year will be nearly double that of last.

General Grant appears to have carried the city of Mexico without a dissenting vote.

The Queen is contemplating going to Germany to visit the tomb of her daughter, the Princess Alice.

The theatre managers of New York have decided to give the St. Patrick's day benefits in aid of the Irish relief fund.

Mr. H. H. Fisher, of Allentown, has the stump of a tree, dug from a coal mine in Schuylkill county, that has turned to solid rock.

The *New York Sun* prints a speech by Senator Bayard during the war wherein the doctrine of secession is not excessively condemned.

The *London Daily News* has the following from St. Petersburg: "A private telegram from Tiflis reports that Persia is actively assembling troops, and trustworthy information has been received that the Persian army will march on Herat."

The East End Hotel, Long Branch, with the adjoining lands, has been sold to Hugh Hastings and John Hoey by Mrs. Jay Gould. The new owners intend to remodel the house in time for occupancy this summer.

The President has returned Gen. Boynton his charge against Gen. Sherman, with this endorsement: "A court-martial in this case is not allowed, inasmuch as the civil courts are an ample remedy for the acts complained of."

Howard Paul has erected a marble monument to the memory of his wife in Brompton cemetery, London. It bears this inscription from Spenser: "Sleep after toyle, porte after stormie seas; ease after warre, death after life does greatly please."

Postmaster General Key was rather roughly handled by representatives of both parties in Congress yesterday, touching the "Star Service" deficiency. The action of the Department in the matter has been in the interest of the people and ought to be endorsed by Congress.

The Republican convention in session at Utica yesterday adopted the following resolution.

Resolved, That the Republicans of New York believe the re election of Ulysses S. Grant as a Presidential candidate of urgent importance, and the delegates this day assembled are called upon and instructed to use their most earnest and united efforts to secure his nomination.

The anti-Grant Republicans of Albany have printed an address giving their reasons for not favoring Grant's nomination. In it they say:

"The Republican party was strong when he was elected. Dissatisfaction was rampant before the close of his first term, promises of amendment were made, but never kept, and at the close of the second term it was for a while doubtful who was President, and the Republicans were a minority in Congress. And if Grant should be again elected we prophesy a like result and a worse one for the

Republican party. So much for General Grant's historical availability."
