It is not generally known, but is nevertheless a fact, that the Supreme Court of this state has decided that the printed figures in the date of a note cannot be changed. For example, the 187 cannot be changed with the pen to read 1880. All the figures must be erased, and the correct numbers be written or printed in.

The following recipe is worth trying for removing fruit and wine stains, especially peach and claret, from table linen. If uncolored, moisten with dilute sulphuric acid, and then rub with a strong aqueous solution of sulphate or hyposulphate of soda, or soak for a short time in a strong aqueous solution of bleaching powder (calcium hypochlorite), press out excess of the liquid, and immerse in dilute sulphuric acid (1 to 10 of water); rinse in cold water, dip in hyposulphite of soda solution, and afterward wash out thoroughly in hot water. If colored, used plenty of soap and amonia water.

A better way to keep "claret" stains from table linen is to keep the vile stuff off the table.

Council Proceedings.

REGULAR SESSION.

COUNCIL CHAMBERS, March 1, 1880.

Present—Burgess Dodge, Councilmen Alger, Holcomb, Jones, Kingsbury, Keeler and Montanye.

Councilman Montanye moved that the reading of the minutes of the last meeting be dispensed with, and that they stand approved as published by the Secretary; Carried.

James Wood, Esq., desired to know what conclusion the Council had arrived at in relation to the claim of Mr. Walborn, for damages to his wagon in crossing the RR. track at the foot of Pine street.

The Finance Committee to whom the matter was referred, were not ready to report, and further time was granted, with the understanding that they would submit their report at the next meeting.

By Councilman Montanye.

Resolved. That the Chief Engineer be and is hereby authorized to sell for the borough, at the best obtainable prices, any or all the old hose or hose carriages and engines not now in use by the Fire Department of the borough.

Adopted.

Councilman Holcomb moved that the Secretary make out a bill against the borough of Athens for 400 feet of hose, at 20 cents per foot, and that the same be given to the Chief Engineer for immediate collection. Adopted.

Councilman Jones, from the Finance Committee to whom was referred the claim of Linta Hose Co. for reimbursement of expenditures for 1878 and 1879, submitted the following resolution, which was adopted without dissent.

Resolved. That as no appropriation has been made to the Linta Hose Co. for the years 1878 and 79, that an appropriation of one hundred and fifty dollars be made to cover the necessary expenses incurred by said Co. for the two years ending January 1, 1880.

By Councilman Holcomb.

Resolved. That the Council approve, and do hereby approve the location of the fifty hydrants, as indicated on the map of the borough by the special committee appointed on the 9th day of October 1879, and the "Towanda Water Works" is hereby authorized and directed to place the said hydrants as so indicated, in the construction of the Water Works under the contract made with said "Towanda Water Works," under date of 28th day of October, A. D., 1879.
