The News Condensed.

The Herald Relief Fund is now \$259,000.

The Persian expedition to Herat has been abandoned.

During the past few days several car loads of fine strawberries from the South, have reached New York.

Senator Hill, of Georgia, has been sued by a young lady of Washington, for seduction.

The total receipts of lumber at Chicago during 1879 were 1,467,720,000 feet, an increase, for the year of 25 per cent.

The town elections in Maine have proven a severe rebuke to Garcelon, nearly every town goes Republican.

Under the call of States in the House for the introduction of bills yesterday, 168 bills and resolutions were offered.

In a letter from Dublin to the Tribune James Redpath gives a terrible picture of the people in the famine stricken counties of Ireland.

The Empress of Austria, it is asserted, never rides a horse after he has once thrown her. Her Irish stables contain six horses for her own riding.

Although the Edison light is pronounced a failure, he is to begin lighting the streets of New York, within a short time.

The President has withdrawn the name of Pinchback as Naval Officer at New Orleans, leaving Lewis, the present incumbent, undisturbed.

Messrs. Sullivan and Gilbert are credited in the London papers with dividing as their share of the Fifth Avenue Theatre receipts, the pleasant sum of \$5,000 a week.

Charles E. Smith, late editor of the Albany Evening Journal, will make application to the Supreme Court to-morrow for a receiver for the Journal company and an accountant. Smith holds one-eighth interest.

The coinage at the American Mints in February was as follows: Gold, 594,120 pieces, worth \$5,844,850; silver, 2,301,609 pieces, worth \$2,300,740; miner coinage, 5,391,300 pieces, worth \$24,399.

Robert Toombs, is said to have a genius for making money, and could be a American Cæsus if he chose; but what he seems to like best is his reputation thro' the country as "the only one and unrepentant rebel."

It is reported that Robert J. Burdette, the wit of The Burlington (Iowa) Hawk-eye, has broken down from overwork, and has been compelled to cancel some lecture engagements. As he is not yet a young man, it may be hoped that the interruption of his work is but temporary.

Dr. W. C. Doane is a great favorite in Williamsport, where he has returned to reside. He has already been pressed into service, and will deliver a lecture on Thursday evening next, at the court house, for the Home for the Friendless. His subject will be "Confessions of a Doctor."

Charles McCarthy, father of the girl Kate McCarthy whose sad fate by freezing to death from exposure in the water and ice of the Chenango river in Binghamton a short time ago is not yet forgotten, died at his residence in that city on Monday, in his 64th year. His death was due solely to his grief at his daughter's sad end.

Gideon Frost, a quaker, aged 82, died at Greenvale, L. I., on Wednesday of last week, leaving property valued at half a million of dollars. He was so afraid of being buried alive, that he directed his body to be kept in a warm room for five days after his death. He was buried on Monday.
