Wednesday. Bishop Andrews presided, assisted by Bishop Bowman. The conference is very full, nearly all the members being present, and will continue in session seveal days.

The Lehigh Valley Railroad Company have under consideration the construction in connection with the Pennsylvania Railroad, of a road from a point on the connecting railway at or near the Ridge Avenue station in Philadelphia, by way of Germantown, Chestnut Hill, Conshohoken and Norristown to Bethlenem.

The reports from Kansas City show that the white man is getting ready to break another solemn promise made to the Indian. The President's proclamation warning all persons against any invasion of the Indian Territory threatens to be of no more effect than a puff of wind. The people are said to be determined to enter the Territory "at all hazards."

The Secretary of the Interior had a conference with Chief Ouray, the Uncompah-

gre, and White River Utes, at which the Indians virtually agreed to accept the terms of the government and cede their reservation as soon as a definite understanding is reached. The Secretary will submit the terms of the agreement to Congress. At a previous interview the Southern Ute delegation consented to give up their present reservation.
